Good People,

I write these words to you all, dearly beloved, on Christmas Eve and prompted by Linus and Charlie Brown, I have been thinking about the "meaning" of Christmas. What does it mean that God – creator of everything – was born in a stable – with nothing? What does it mean that the power that keeps the stars and planets spinning in their courses took form among us as a newborn child? Just what is this mysterious connection between helplessness and power, weakness and strength, despair and hope, darkness and light, death, and life? What does it mean that God always, always, and already, comes to us wrapped in unexpectedness and surprise?

This past Sunday, after serving at Grace & Glory, I drove down to south side Virginia to preach at a little country church. Buffalo Presbyterian was built in the late 1800's and stands at the end of a dirt road. Built of wood and painted white, with two potbellied stoves and a simple wooden pulpit inside, Buffalo remains stoically faithful in the face of dwindling attendance and resources. The piano player that Sunday, a young friend of mine, brought his wife and their new baby.

Throughout the service – and during my sermon – the baby fussed and squirmed the way hungry babies do. The mother was embarrassed but everyone else was delighted. It had been a long time since a baby was heard in that church and the sound filled folks with a sense of both nostalgia and of new possibility.

Yesterday and today, I have been spending some time with Barbara Haas, a member here at Grace & Glory, doing my best to help her with her dying. Her breathing is not easy, and I know that she is anxious and afraid, yet when she holds my hand and looks in my eyes she seems to find some comfort and joy. This is a mystery to me since I do not know Barbara very well and clearly she does not recognize me now. So who does she see when she looks at me? Whose hand does she think she's holding? Surely, not mine. Yet, who else – who else could possibly be in the room?

Barbara reminds me that our true lives are hidden in Christ – hers and mine. We live so much of our lives thinking we are in control that we forget that in our beginning and in our ending – in our being born and in our dying – we are surrounded by mystery. Barbara Haas stands on the edge of eternity, wrapped in the wideness of God's love, facing a new possibility.

Holding a baby in my arms one day and the hand of a dying woman the next, I wonder about the meaning of all this love and suffering, this sacrifice and delight. What holds us all together, Barbara and the baby and I? What is the secret thread that intertwines our lives? I don't know. I can only guess. But it seems to me that it has something to do with the real meaning of Christmas. And to paraphrase the liner notes of one of my favorite Christmas albums by John Fahey, I don't think Christmas really has much to do "with Christmas trees, presents, Santa Claus," or singing familiar carols. "The New Possibility is rather the gift of reconciliation between God and [people]. [God] is for all [people] at all times and places...It is Christmas all year; let us rejoice ecstatically...."

It is Christmas all year; so let us rejoice ecstatically in our new possibility! Amen.

Leadership Team Meeting Summary

The Leadership Team met on Dec. 18, 2024

<u>Pastor's Report</u>: Pastor William shares that this has been a very rich time for him personally and hopes that it is for the church as well. The gradual increase in attendance and membership has been gratifying. He remains busy with hospital visitations and preparation for the numerous upcoming holiday services planned.

<u>President's Report</u>: Pat is pleased that in the past 10 months we have received four new members. The Stewardship campaign has been very successful, exceeding our goal for this year, and for the third straight month income has exceeded that of the previous year.

<u>Finance Report</u>: The November finance report was presented by Chris Sterner. A small bookkeeping error continues to be pursued but is small and not a concern. Motion by Paul to approve; second by George. Unanimous approval.

Old Business:

2025 Spending Plan: Chris presented the 2025 spending plan draft. It was suggested that the Property Team meet to discuss our readiness for unexpected expenses that may arise as our building is over 10 years old. Chris asks that anyone aware of expenses not already identified speak to him in advance of our annual congregation meeting in January, which will include presentation of the spending plan to the congregation.

Bookkeeper position: Our bookkeeper, Stephanie Wirth, has stated that her full-time job is making it more difficult to keep up with her responsibilities at Grace & Glory and is agreeable to our seeking a replacement. Chris has been in contact with **a** promising prospect that appears qualified and affordable. Stephanie has suggested a possible candidate as well.

Shepherding Program: Pat described the Shepherding Program as a way for everyone in our congregation to keep in touch with one another. The concept is that the congregation would be divided into flocks with each flock assigned a shepherd, who is in turn supported by the Pastor. Notes, cards, calls, emails or texts might be exchanged with members on special occasions or when they have unexpected or prolonged absence from church; support is offered during a member's illness or time of grief; a shepherd's welcome smile may greet a flock member on Sunday morning; or your shepherd may just be someone to talk to when times are tough. A description of the Shepherding Program and invitation to serve as a shepherd will be announced at an upcoming worship service.

Call Committee update: No new information regarding potential candidates has come from the Synod, but the committee has been advised that in anticipation of new candidate interest occurring on short notice, they should be well prepared for a candidate visit and interview. A review of our Ministry Site Profile should be conducted in case there is any need to update our church information.

Advent Worship Folder feedback: Response by the congregation has been positive about the new Sunday worship folder. With less paper to handle and shuffle through during the service, people can follow the service more easily. It has also been observed that visitors are less likely to lose their place during different portions of the service with this new format.

Worship Attendance records: Conversation continues on the most efficient way to track our Sunday worship attendance. The use of our attendance books and head counts by the ushers have their drawbacks, yet accurate member attendance is important information that is shared with the ELCA. It was agreed that starting in 2025 we would use the attendance register during Lent (6 weeks) and Advent (4 weeks). The rest of the year we will rely on a headcount only.

Evangelism Team update: At their December meeting, the Evangelism team recommended that we invite the members of the three area Methodist churches to Pastor Tom Frost's presentation on January 22 about his pilgrimage on the Camino de Santiago, as well as the film presentation of *The Way* the week before. The church secretary will send invitations to those three churches after the New Year.

It was decided that we will conduct a small mass mailing in our area for our Easter service in order to measure the response of that method of advertising. Both the Christmas Eve service and the Blue Christmas on Dec. 21 were advertised in the Fluvanna Review, on Facebook and on our website.

An annual calendar of special events is being drafted that will be issued in January, providing ample notice of each event. Appropriate advertising will take place in advance of the events.

Stewardship Campaign update: A total of 28 pledges have been received so far totaling \$167,700, an increase of \$23,258 over last year and exceeding our goal.

Annual Reviews: Self assessments are being completed by the paid staff in preparation for their annual reviews. We have already received valuable feedback from these self-assessments which will be acted on.

Recycling: After contacting our trash service contractor, we learned that they cannot provide recycling service at the church location because it is outside of their current recycling route. Chris Sterner agreed to take home any paper for recycling while Pastor agreed to handle any cans or bottles, and he committed to putting a container out to collect these items. Pat said he could recycle any cardboard.

Women at Grace and Glory Bible Study

Right now, as we transition from an old to a new year, rather than focusing on how we fall short, we can indeed remember God's continual gift of grace.



Bishop Eaton's message on Syria

In the ELCA, we recognize that some of our members are of Syrian nationality or heritage. Through ecumenical bodies such as the Middle East Council of Churches, we have long been in relationship with the Syrian Christian communities, which date back to the earliest days of the church and whose members live and worship today as a religious minority that is not always welcomed or accepted. These Christians hope that a new Syria will include a place of safety, security, and freedom of worship for them and their neighbors. Syria's diversity is integral to the fabric of Syrian society and should be protected.

In this Advent season of expectation, please join me in praying for all the people of Syria. We pray that those who have walked in suffering, oppression and occupation will be liberated by our liberating God. We pray for political prisoners to be set free, for families to be reunited, for those wronged to secure justice, and for all Syrians to live, work and worship in peace. We pray also for those who mourn the dead and missing, and who fear the uncertain future.

If your prayer moves you to action, I encourage you to give to the Lutheran Disaster Response (LDR) Middle East appeal, which will continue to send aid to our partners, the Middle East Council of Churches, ACT Alliance, and the Lutheran World Federation, as they support those in need in Syria in the coming days.
